South Indians on the Plantation Frontier in Malaya

This sophisticated analysis of migrant Tamil laborers, the first of its kind, focuses on a Malayan rubber plantation—from colonial times, through Japanese occupation in World War II, to independence. Concentrating on the changing influence of the social strata of the estate, the author discusses the values of equality and inequality in the social structure, economic organization, and political process on an estate worked by settled foreigners. Cambodian is one of the major national languages of Southeast Asia, and the increasing importance of Cambodia in world affairs makes the practical study of its language and culture especially timely. The two newest volumes in the Yale Linguistic Series are intended to meet the considerable need for authoritative texts. *Modern Spoken Cambodian* provides the student with a thorough command of the basic structures of standard spoken Cambodian. The course is based on the audio-oral method of language teaching developed by the Intensive Language Program of the American Council of Learned Societies and used successfully in World War II, but modified to take into account advances in language teaching techniques since that time. *Cambodian System of Writing and Beginning Reader*, designed for use in conjunction with *Modern Spoken Cambodian*, consists of four parts: The Cambodian Writing System; Programmed Reading Exercises; Beginning Cambodian Reader—fifty selections, graded in length and difficulty; and the Cambodian-English Glossary, containing some 2,000 words.

PARTY LEADERSHIP AND REVOLUTIONARY POWER IN CHINA

Edited by JOHN WILSON LEWIS

Timely discussions by twelve American and British specialists on factors governing the evolution of the Chinese Communist Party, edited by Professor Lewis of Stanford University. The articles relate to problems of leadership, power and the revolutionary struggle within the Party and their effect on Chinese society. The most spectacular archaeological discovery of our time was made at Pazyryk in the Altai Mountains of western Siberia: here, perfectly preserved in the ice for 2500 years, were the tattooed bodies of many nomad chiefs—probably the Scythians mentioned by Herodotus—and their horses. Within the chambers everything of organic origin was in almost pristine condition. Many perishable objects, whose existence in other burial sites of the same period could only be inferred, were here to be examined—everyday articles as well as sumptuous ritualistic pieces; hemp-smoking equipment; carts, wagons, saddlery—of better design and workmanship than any known to the later, classical world. The remarkable pictures accompanying the text vivify the strange beauty of a remote time and place.

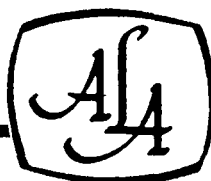

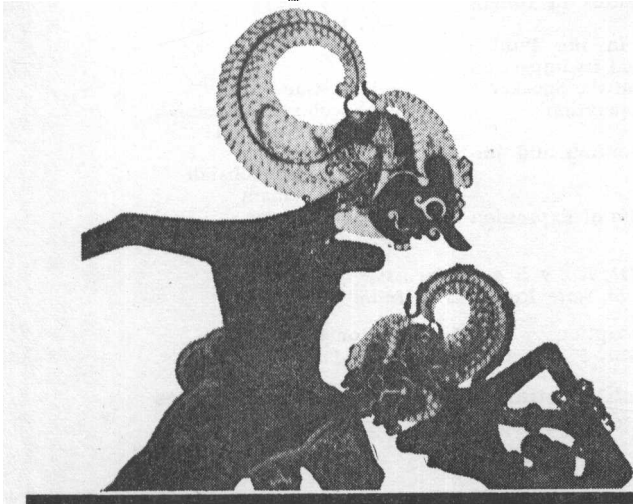

A Primer of Sōtō Zen

A translation of Dōgen's *Shōbōgenzō Zuimonki*

By Reihō Masunaga

Most Westerners are unaware that there are two major schools of Zen Buddhism: Rinzai Zen—popularized in the West largely through the writings of Dr. Daisetz Suzuki—and Sōtō Zen. Ultimately, both seek enlightenment in this existence, but they can be said to be almost diametrically opposed in their *approaches* to this goal. Although it remains relatively unknown in the West, Sōtō Zen eventually attracted the greatest number of followers in Japan.

The *Shōbōgenzō Zuimonki* consists largely of brief talks, hortatory remarks, and instructional and cautionary comments by the Sōtō Zen Master Dōgen (1200-1253). Translated, *Shōbōgenzō* means “The Eye of the True Law.” Roughly, *Zuimonki* means “easy for the ears to understand,” or simplified. The *Zuimonki* does not give the full scope of the principles of Sōtō Zen. For this one must look to Dōgen’s monumental *Shōbōgenzō* itself, considered by many to be the greatest philosophical work ever written in Japan. In the *Zuimonki*, Dōgen’s comments very often are directed towards the beginner in Zen and to lay followers. On these terms, it remains an excellent introduction to the study of Sōtō Zen in the words of the founder of the school.

Australia and the Colonial Question at the United Nations

British decolonization has posed acute problems for Australia, first, because it has transformed her political environment from an umbrella of submerged colonial societies to a collection of volatile independent states and, second, because it has affected her own colonial position in strategically sensitive Papua and New Guinea.

This study examines the Australian diplomatic response to the phenomenon of decolonization and to the alienation of Western authority in Africa, Asia, the Middle East, and Oceania. The setting is the United Nations. It has been here that political pressure on the colonial idea has been most openly and consistently applied; and here that Australia has been forced, year after year, to record her reaction to a host of developments in the breakdown of new states.
