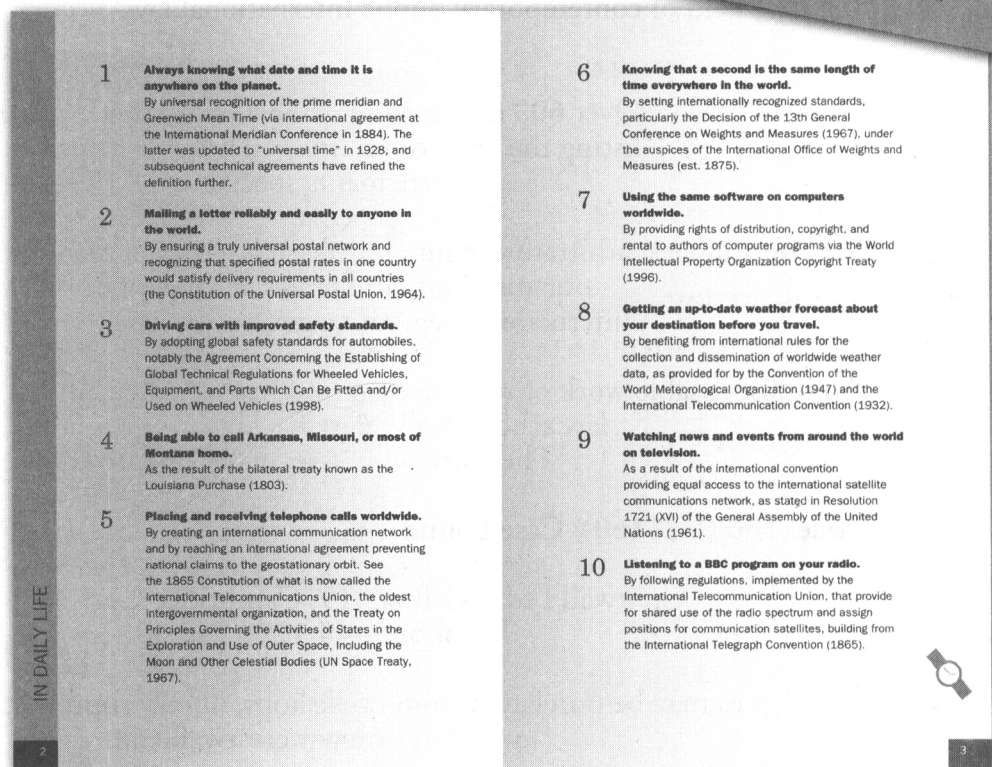
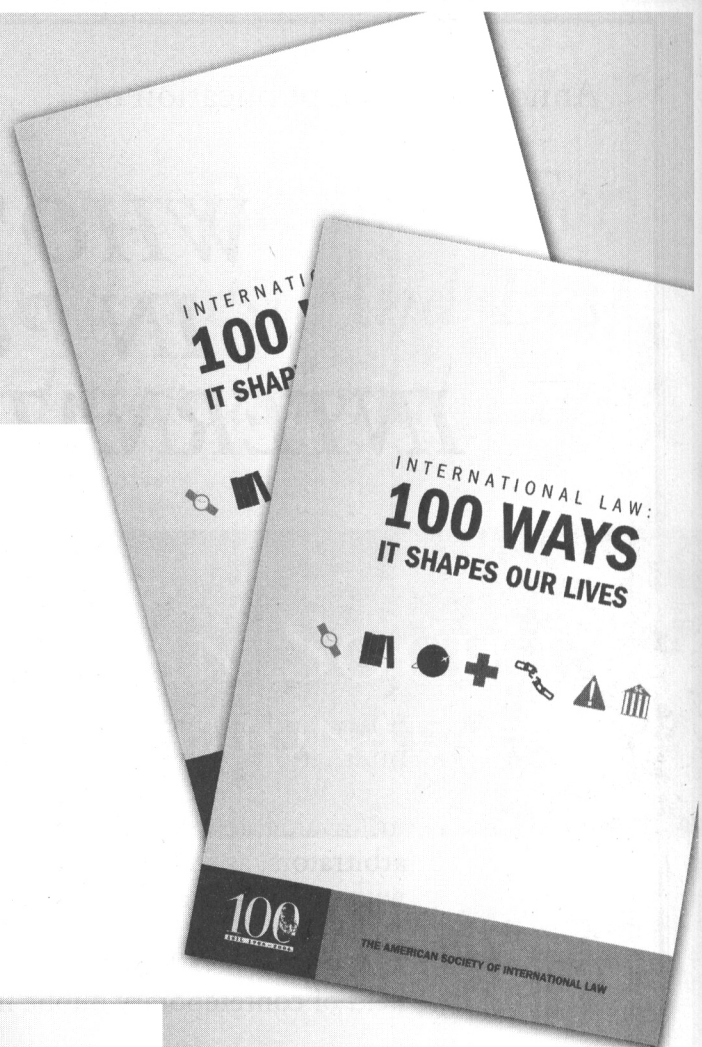
Many find international law abstract and static. Topics such as war and peace or relationships between countries are considered by some to be not so much questions of law, but of power and influence. Others question the existence of international law.

## Note from the Managing Editor

This volume of *International Legal Materials* presents a rich diversity of international law documents. Two of the documents discuss the extra-territorial application of jurisdiction, albeit in quite different contexts: the House of Lords decision *Al-Skeini v. Secretary of State* addresses the possible applicability of the UK Human Rights Act to British soldiers for the killing of Iraqi citizens in Basra; while the High Court of Canada decision in *R. v. Hape* examines it in the context of the constitutionality of searches and seizures that the Royal Canadian Mounted Police conducted in the Turks and Caicos. The United States Supreme Court Foreign Sovereign Immunities Act decision *Permanent Mission of India to the United Nations v. New York*, is intriguing both because Justice Thomas penned it, and because of its broader possible ramifications in the area of taxation of international organizations. The European Court of Human Rights judgment, *Behrami v. France*, in which the court held that it lacks the competence under the European Convention on Human Rights to examine states' contributions in Kosovo in fulfillment of their duties pursuant to a UN Security Council Chapter VII resolution, raises fascinating, and at times troubling issues regarding the inter-relationship of international organizations.

This volume of *International Legal Materials* provides twelve introductory notes to the legal texts, and I would like to thank all of the authors who took time away from their summer to write a piece for us. I am particularly grateful to the contributions from the members of the Editorial Advisory Board who wrote introductory notes for this volume: David Stewart, Charles Owen Verrill, and Bruce Zagaris. Two introductory note authors: Kevin Futch, and Rakhee Vemulapalli, served as legal interns on the *International Law in Brief* at ASIL this summer, and their work demonstrates that we have much to anticipate from the future generation of international lawyers.

## Guidelines for Submission of Documents
