

25 Black Students Selected for Summer Institute

Twenty-five black students from across the nation were selected to participate in the Summer Institute in Political Science for Black Students June 12-July 22, held in Baton Rouge, Louisiana at Louisiana State University and Southern University.

The Association, with support from the Ford Foundation, has sponsored the Summer Institute since 1986. It is designed to encourage black students to pursue academic careers in political science and has five primary objectives:

- to introduce the participants to leading issues and problems in the discipline and profession of political science;
- to inform students of career opportunities for political scientists;
- to enhance the general academic skills of the participants, making them more competitive applicants for graduate school admission and financial assistance,
- to introduce students to quantitative and analytical methods of study in political science;
- to expose participants to leading scholars in the discipline

The program is open to black students in their junior year of undergraduate study. Co-directors of the Institute were Jewel Prestage, Dean of the School of Public Policy and Urban Affairs, Southern University, and Peter Zwick, Chair, Department of Political Science, Louisiana State University.
