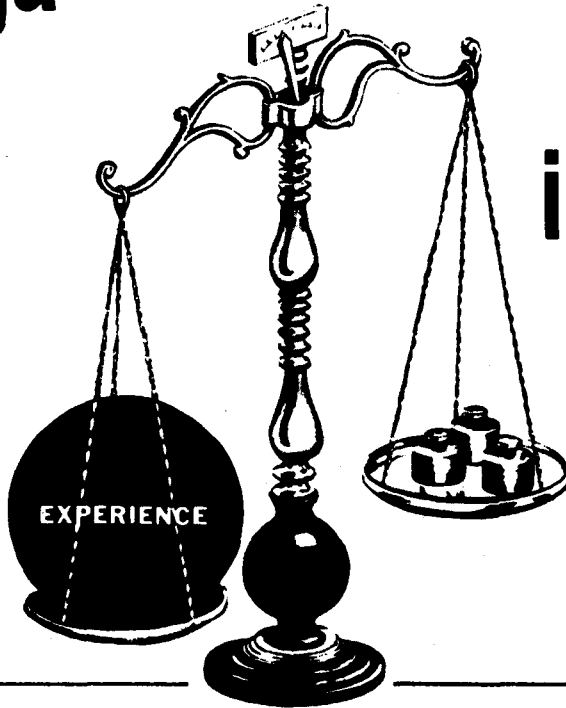

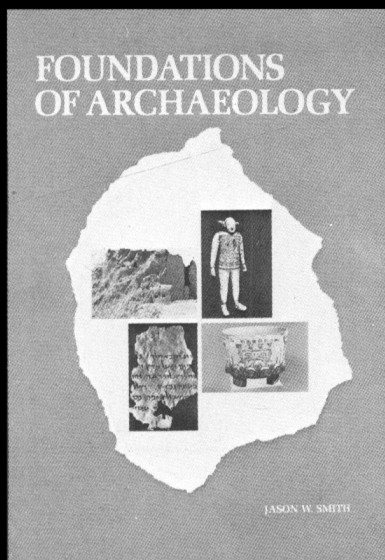

**FOUNDATIONS OF ARCHAEOLOGY**

The *complete* introduction to archaeology, this text presents theory, method, and technique within the framework of world prehistory. Throughout the book, emphasis is on technological and economic factors as the key influences in shaping sociocultural phenomena — the essence of modern archaeological theory, or cultural materialism. By using a theoretical approach to basic archaeology, the author is able to connect a study of world prehistory with a study of archaeological research techniques — in one unified presentation. Also examined is the critical role of other disciplines in solving the varied, difficult questions of social causality and process.

The text is illustrated with approximately 200 photos, line drawings, graphs, maps, and charts. Quotes from recognized authorities open each chapter. A brief review (“In Short”) of key ideas and techniques plus an annotated list of suggested readings conclude each chapter. A thorough Teacher’s Manual includes: procedures for organizing a dig, objective questions and answers for each chapter, subjective questions for essay writing, and a list of audio-visual aids.
