Héctor Linares is a Ph.D. candidate in Early Modern Global History, Race & Ethnicity, and Latin American History at Pennsylvania State University. His research explores the intersection of authority, religion, race, law, and globalism in the early Iberian world, particularly the role of Indigenous, Asian, and African descendants in Iberian aristocratic institutions. Héctor is the author of numerous peer-reviewed publications, including five edited volumes. His research has been generously funded by The John Carter Brown Library, the Renaissance Society of America, the Folger Library, the Newberry Library Center for Renaissance Studies, the European Union, the Casa de Velázquez, and Penn State University.

Erin E. O'Connor is Professor of History at Bridgewater State University in Massachusetts. She specializes in the intersection of gender with social and political history since 1800, with a research focus on Ecuador. Her publications include *Gender, Indian, Nation: The Contradictions of Making Ecuador, 1830-1925* (2007; also published in Spanish in 2016); *Mothers Making Latin America: Gender, Households, and Politics since 1825* (2014); and the two-volume document collection on gender, race, and empire/nation titled *Documenting Latin America*, co-edited with Leo J. Garofalo (2011). Her current research interrogates the multiple meanings of domesticity in Ecuadorian politics and labor from 1850-1950.

Jaime M. Pensado is Associate Professor of History at the University of Notre Dame. He is the author of *Rebel Mexico: Student Unrest and Authoritarian Political Culture During the Long Sixties* (Stanford University Press, 2013) and *Love and Despair: How Catholic Activism Shaped Politics and the Counterculture in Modern Mexico* (University of California Press, 2023).
